The Province of BC recently elevated east Vancouver Island and other areas in the province to provincial Drought Level 4 and as such most municipalities have moved to Stage 4 Watering Restrictions which is a comprehensive watering ban. The lower mainland, Sunshine Coast and west Vancouver Island have now reached Drought level 5. As well, the fire danger rating is extreme for our region of east Vancouver Island. 
Tsunami Awareness for BC's Coastal Areas

Tsunamis are rare but serious events: being prepared and knowing what to do can save lives. Most tsunamis are caused by huge undersea earthquakes. BC's coastline is tectonically active: a major fault lies along western Haida Gwaii and the Juan de Fuca Plate subducts under the North American Plate west of Vancouver Island. It is the movement between tectonic plates that causes earthquakes.

When tsunami warnings or advisories are issued, emergency officials may refer to BC's five tsunami zones. The Parksville-Qualicum area is in Zone E, but Vancouver Island covers 4 tsunami zones! It is wise to know the tsunami zones and hazards where you live, work, play, and visit. If you feel strong shaking, hear a loud roaring sound coming from the ocean and/or see the water recede abnormally far/quickly, these can be precursors to a tsunami. Once any shaking has stopped, immediately move inland to high ground (more than 20m above sea level). Then, stay there! Tsunami waves can last many hours. Follow the instructions of local officials before assuming the event is over.

Not all earthquakes cause tsunamis and not all tsunamis are caused by earthquakes!
